It is always a great pleasure at the end of a long term to reflect back on the achievements of the last 14 weeks. I am so proud of the community we are shaping together and this year, our focus is on ensuring our community spirit and motto: work hard be kind is at the centre of all that we do.

Our students have been setting themselves targets related to our five attitudes to learning: willing to learn, resilience, determined, reflective and self-motivated. Through this we have seen students use and demonstrate these attitudes in their lessons. Our future focus is to deepen their understanding of how these attitudes form part of their character rather than something they just do in school.

Our assemblies often incorporate these themes and it was lovely to see so many students support our reverse advent calendar which saw many donations go to our local food bank for people who need support, particularly at this time of year.

Continuing with the community theme, it is great to have had such a positive response from you as parents/carers to our request for a group of parent ambassadors. Miss Britten will be leading this group and plans to have joint meetings with the student council to develop some key areas in school such as reading and attitude to learning. It is fantastic to have so much support and willingness to work together.

Another exciting area of development is a large project involving the school and local community. For a number of years, many of us have been keen to improve the safety outside of school and there has been much discussion about having a road crossing closer to the school entrance. We are very fortunate to have the support of our local councillor who is initiating some meetings to create a fundraising group to work together to make this a reality. This group will comprise of representatives from the school, council and local area. We anticipate that this will be long-term project. In the meantime we continue to request that parents/carers are considerate of the safety of all students and do not drop off or pick up students close to the front of school unless using a designated parking bay. We are still having to contact parents directly for parking on the yellow zig-zags or stopping dangerously in the road.

The spring term will see that start of some significant changes: all parents/carers will have received a letter about our new detention system and all students have had this explained during assemblies. As explained in the letter, this has been re-designed to give a stronger impact for students in understanding the consequences of their behaviours.

All teaching staff have been spending a great deal of time on curriculum planning as part of the long-term project throughout the whole trust on the 'knowledge led curriculum'. This is an area that all secondary schools are working on. Nationally, the focus is to ensure that all students experience the National Curriculum at the appropriate time and for an increasing number of students to follow an EBacc pathway at GCSE. The details of this are being worked on by the trust and in the spring term, we will communicate further about how this will affect NFS. Please be assured that during all times of change our priority always remains for the decisions we make to be in the best interest of our students.

No matter what your beliefs, Christmas is often a time for rest and catching up with family and friends. I hope that all of our students and families enjoy the holiday and I wish you all a peaceful and joyful break.

Heritage Learning Day

This half term, 15 of our Year 9 students had the opportunity to experience a Heritage Learning Day. Working alongside UNESCO, as part of Nottingham's status as City of Literature, the event had a unique focus to merge the disciplines of English Literature and History through 'discovery'. Students had the opportunity to connect, collaborate and learn hands-on creative techniques and skills through writing and illustration by interpreting stories told through places, buildings, objects, artefacts and manuscripts all with a focus on Nottingham's literary and cultural heritage.

As part of the day our students engaged with the history of William Booth and the Salvation Army through a unique board game designed by a student from Nottingham University; developed their knowledge of DH Lawrence through various artefacts and interactive experiences; explored the women of Chatsworth and even recreated the killing of King Richard III. The students really enjoyed this creative experience.

The sixth form has had a successful first term. Students have made the transition from GCSE to A level learning very quickly, making use of the study areas and the chance to manage their own learning more independently. NFS takes its responsibilities for our students' lives online very seriously and we will be using the newsletter to inform parent/carers of any new technologies and give advice to help keep students safe online.

New apps and updates to be aware of:

Yubo - a new dating app for U18's

Sayat.me - similar to ask.fm - people can comment on you personally and remain anonymous.

YouTube - have announced plans to add new settings to its kids app, including giving parents the option to hand-pick every individual video and channels they are happy for their children to see.

Snapchat - have launched a group video chat feature this month, allowing up to 16 people to join one video chat at one time.

Instagram - now lets users share multiple photos and videos on their stories.

Instagram - has also launched a 'focus' filter to the story mode which blurs the background when taking a portrait or selfie, making photos look more professional.

Spotify - have introduced a 'data saver' feature for their free users, which optimises the listening experience using less mobile data.

Facebook Messenger - is planning to implement a new feature that will allow users to unsend messages. Watch this space!

How to evaluate online content

Following new Department for Education guidance, schools and parents need to teach children how to evaluate what they see online. Can they trust what they are seeing? We have to embrace the internet and it is our responsibility to teach them how to remain safe. Questions that could be asked include

- Is this website/URL/email fake? How can I tell?
- What does this cookie do and what information am I sharing?
- Is this person who they say they are?
- Why does someone want me to see this?
- Why does someone want me to send this?
- Why would someone want me to believe this?
- Why does this person want my personal information?
- What's behind this post?
- Is this too good to be true?
- Is this fact or opinion?

New data management system

In January we will be moving over to a new data management system. This affects all of our data storage and every electronic system that we have in school. All parents/carers will receive a letter with more detail about this. Whilst we will endeavour to make this transition as smooth as possible, please do bear with us if there are any small glitches. We politely request that all parents download the new app: My Child At School as this will be used to send information and messages.

Jewellery

Students may wear a watch (no apple devices) and a plain pair of gold/silver (no jewels) stud earrings but no other jewellery is permitted due to health and safety issues and liability in case of loss. Therefore, if students wish to have any part of their body pierced they must arrange this at the beginning of the summer holidays so that the wound has sufficient time to heal. Plasters may not be worn to cover body jewellery. If students disregard this they will be isolated from other students until they comply with the regulation.

STAR Reading Tests and Accelerated Reader

Reading for pleasure is the single most important thing that will make a child successful in life.

UNESCO, 2011

All students take the STAR reading test three or four times a year so we can monitor their progress with reading and find out their reading age. The next test will take place at the start of next term. Students will record their reading age in the Reading Log section of their planners. We encourage parent/carers to discuss this with students and encourage them to read to improve it where necessary.

All students in Year 7 follow the Accelerated Reader scheme where they choose an appropriate level book and take a quiz on that book when they have finished it. This is to start all of our students off on the right

track when it comes to reading at secondary school. In Years 8 and 9 those whose reading age is below their chronological age are placed on the Accelerated Reader Scheme and have a one to one session every week to discuss their reading progress.

All students are expected to read for 30 minutes every day as part of their homework. 15 minutes of this is timetabled in DEAR (Drop Everything And Read) which takes place at the start of one lesson every day. The additional time students are expected to do outside of this at home and should record this in the reading log in their planner. GCSE exams have a reading age of 15 years so it is important that every student who is not at their current age works towards this.

We ask all parents/carers to encourage their children to read over the holidays; books from school, books they have at home or visit your local library.

Overdue Library Books

We currently have 117 books that have been overdue for four or more weeks, the value of which is over \pounds 814. Parent(s)/Carer(s) of these students will have had an email or letter requesting the return of these books. We ask that the book is returned, but if it cannot be found then a replacement is purchased or the value of the book is paid to the school office.

Whilst we do not issue fines for overdue books, students are regularly reminded that they have an overdue book through their school email account and by their tutor. We would ask all parents/carers to encourage students to return or renew their book when they receive the first email. Replacing these books would take away from purchasing new books for all our students.
