## From the Head of School

Dear Parent(s)/Carer(s),

As we approach the end of the second full year of Nottingham Free School it's a fantastic feeling to reflect on all of the achievements of our school community.

Our students have enjoyed a very successful year and are looking forward to the challenges which lie ahead, particularly the start of GCSE courses for those moving into year 9, and those in year 8 will be making their option subject choices. Our new year 7 cohort have also enjoyed a wide variety of transition activities and were made to feel very welcome by all of our current students.

Part of our unique situation is increasing by a new year group every year, and as part of this we need to review our systems and structures.
